- Continue down the street, past the castle gatehouse, to the River Till. This is a beautiful spot to take a break. Here you will find the start of the signposted Riverside Walk that follows the Till downstream, past the ruins of a chantry chapel and a barley mill.
- Retrace your steps to
 Heatherslaw and the finish. Here
 you'll find Heatherslaw Light
 Railway and Ravn Clay pottery
 studio and shop.

You can cross the iron footbridge to explore more of Heatherslaw. Here you'll find the Visitor Centre, Boes Café and Heatherslaw Corn Mill. The mill has operated on this site since the 13th century and is now a working museum where you can learn how the power of water is harnessed to produce flour (Open daily, April to early November). Opposite the mill is Handmade at Heatherslaw, which sells jewellery and papercut art, all made on the premises.

Walking Route

Distance: 2 miles (3.2 km)

Grade: Easy linear walk. Suitable for families with young children and buggies.



Follow the directions below in conjunction with the map inside and the colour-coded waymarkers along the route.

- A Start at the car park beside Heatherslaw Light Railway.
- B Follow the Route 68 cycle path, which goes past fields almost all the way to Etal. The entrance is via a large gate situated between Heatherslaw Railway car park and the **B6345** road.
- G At the end of the path a gate brings you out at Letham Hill junction. Cross to the path on the other side of the road and walk past Tillside Cricket Club's pitch towards Etal Village. Black Hebridean sheep sometimes graze in the fields here. Just beyond the cricket pitch is The Chapel of The Blessed Virgin Mary, the village church that was consecrated in 1859
- Turn left into the pretty village of Etal. Here you will find The Black Bull, Northumberland's only thatched pub, and The Lavender Tearooms. Both serve food and refreshments. Further down the street is the impressive gatehouse of Etal Castle. The castle site is managed by English Heritage (open April to Nov) and the entrance is via a gate at the far end of Etal Castle car park.
